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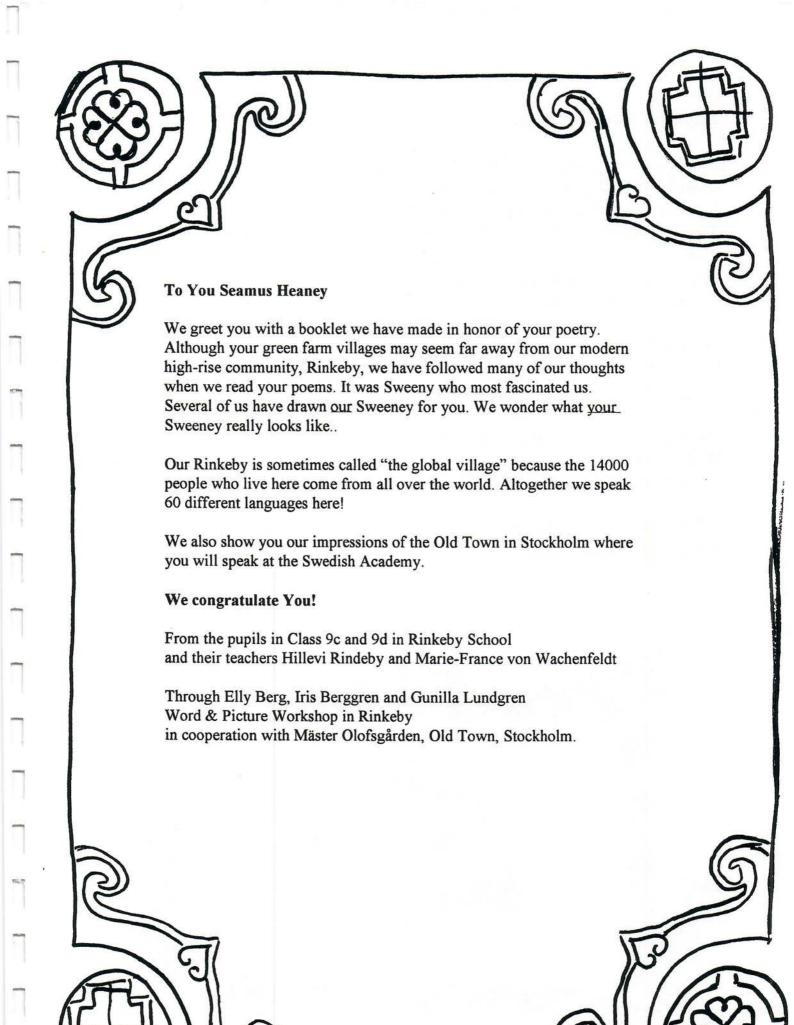

Rinkeby - the village of the world

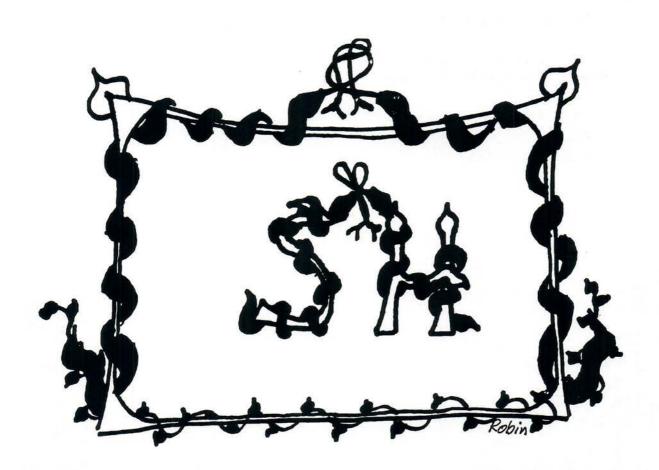
Rinkeby is a small suburb of Stockholm. Rinkeby has 14 000 inhabitants. Maybe 100 languages are spoken here.

Rinkeby is a multicultural area, a mixture of many different cultures and religions. This makes people, who don't fit in in Swedish society, feel confident.

People started to build Rinkeby in the late 1960's. There was a housing shortage in Sweden and one million houses had to be built quickly. People from the north came to Rinkeby, to get a job in a big city. Many foreign men came here with their families because they could find good apartments. The first immigrants came here because Swedish society needed workforce. Today it's only political refugees and refugees from war areas that come here.

Unfortunately, Rinkeby has its problems. But the youths of today in Rinkeby, have started to realize that criminality for example doesn't lead anywhere, and they start concentrating more on studies.

All this together creates a harmony that can be found only in Rinkeby. Rinkeby is unique.



The Rinkeby School

The school was built in 1970.

There are 410 pupils in the school. The majority have immigrant background, mostly from Turkey, Greece and Somalia.

Some days there are pupils who are "on duty". That means that we have to help the cleaners to sweep the corridor, help the kitchen ladies to do the wash up, and help the caretaker to go and get the mail (the school mail).

The Rinkeby School has been renovated this year. The inside yard is now a big assembly-hall. On the outside of the school there has been a change of colours. Now it is one of the finest schools in Stockholm.

We are 16 students in this group and we speak different languages: Serbian, Swedish, Spanish, Danish, Turkish, Arabic, Russian, French and Greek. Everybody speaks good Swedish. We learn sports and languages and so on. We are all friends in the class.

Five of the students don't live in Rinkeby. There are 16 Christians of whom 4 are Orthodox plus one Muslim. We have a good teacher in Swedish. We have three Swedish groups. We are divided according to our knowledge of Swedish. We are the best group. We get many books to read and then write about them. We get lots of homework. Some students meet after school to dance and to do sports in their spare time. Now you know all about us.

The Old Town

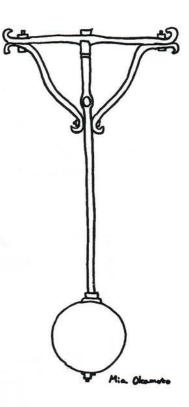
The well: stone-iron-water, three important elements for Stockholm.

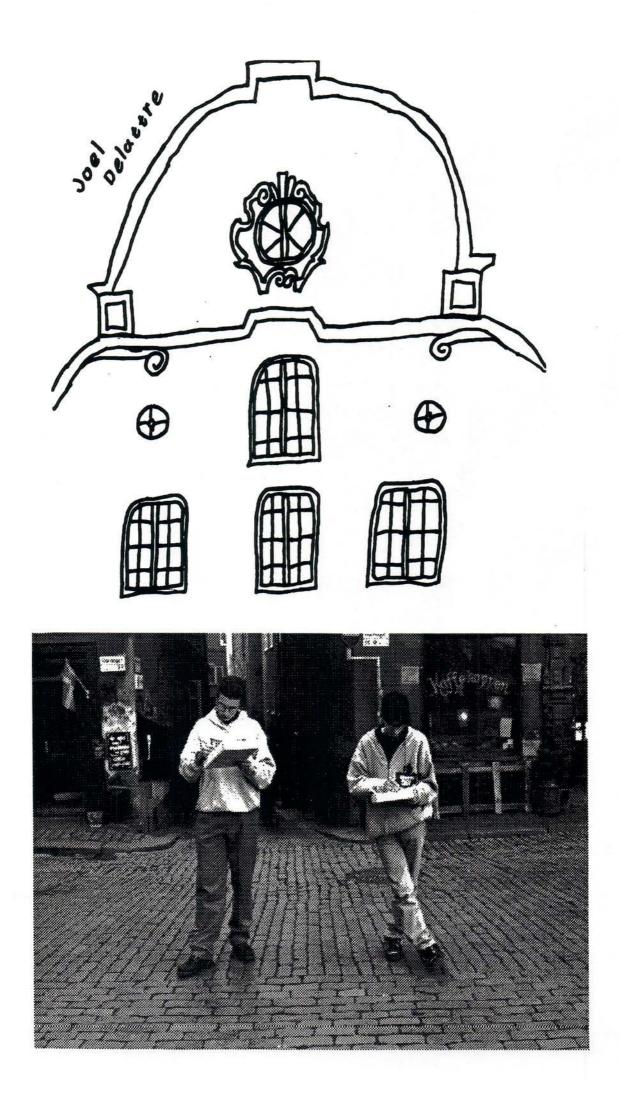


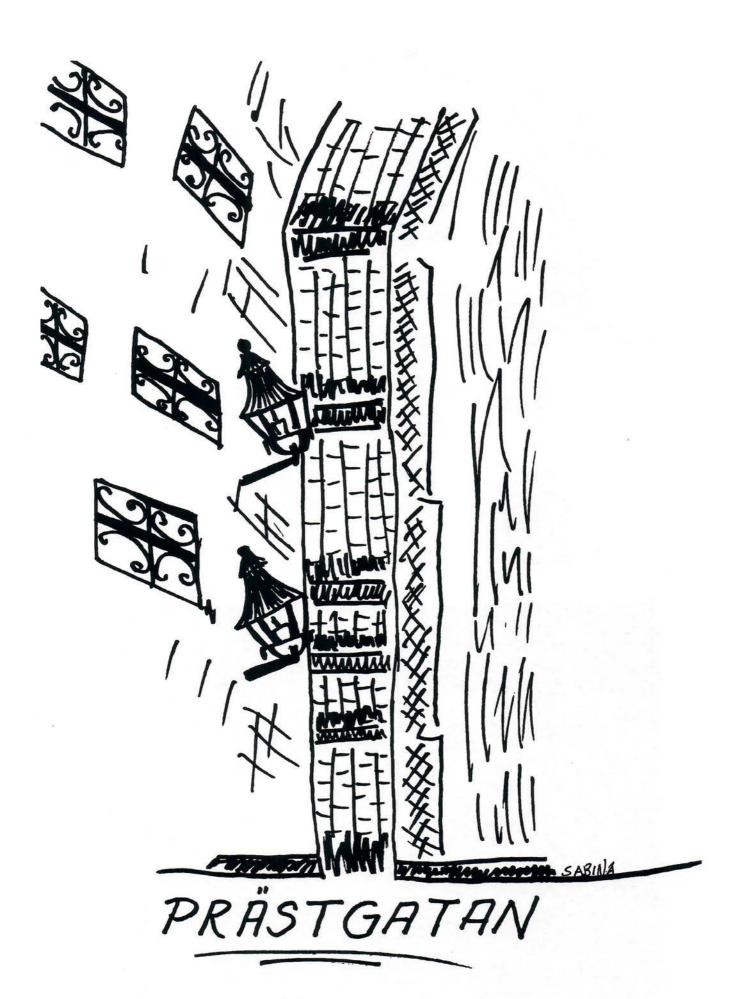


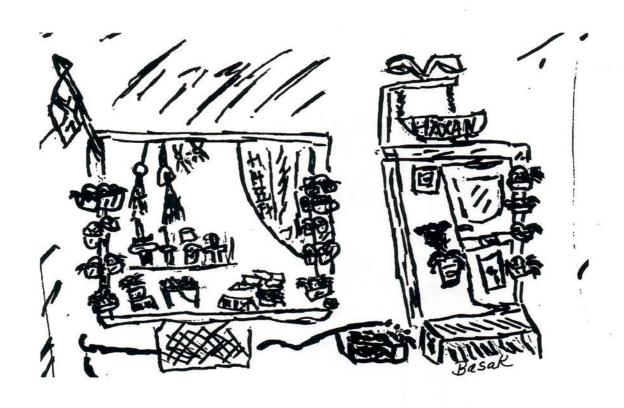
The beautiful house

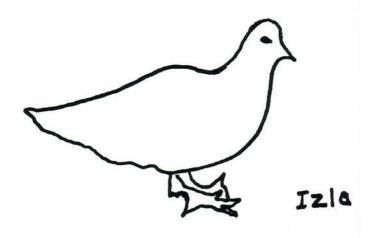




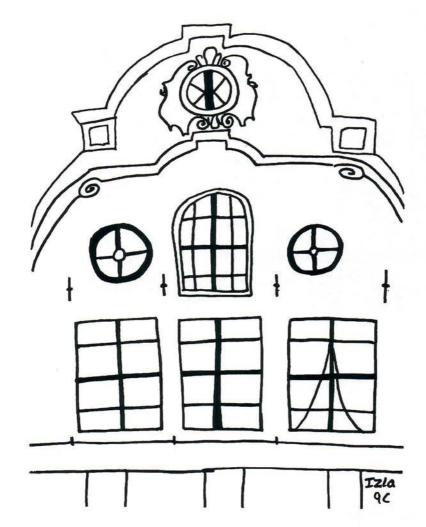
Gamla Stan

The flame of Elin Wägner

Sweeney become very angry and went over to stop them.

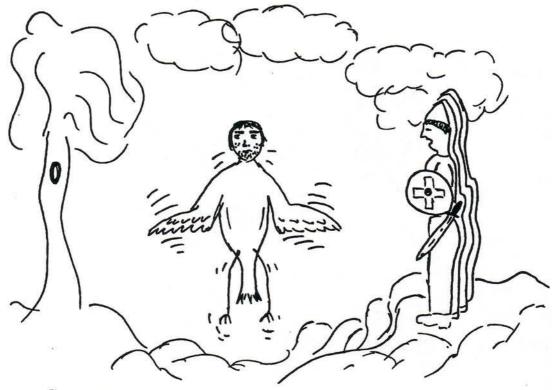
When Sweeney started to argue with the Christians, he started to fight with a soldier. Sweeney accidently killed the soldier. As a punishment for killing the soldier a curse

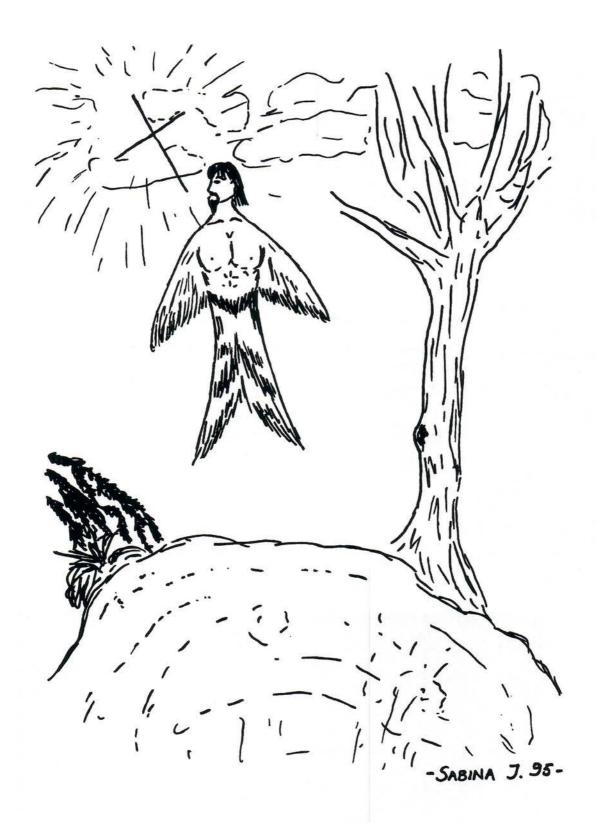
The Legend

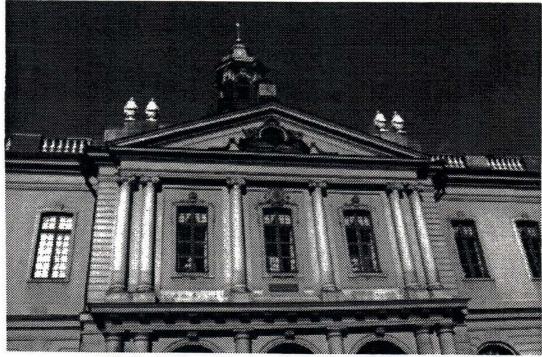
More about The Old Town

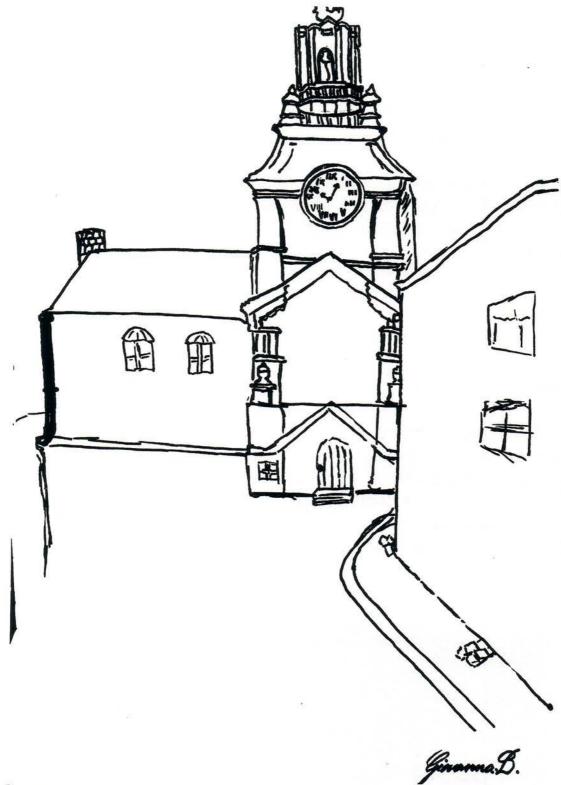

Gamla Stan - Old Town

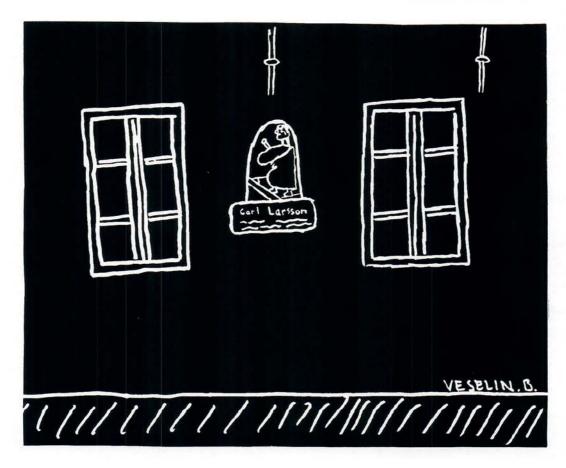

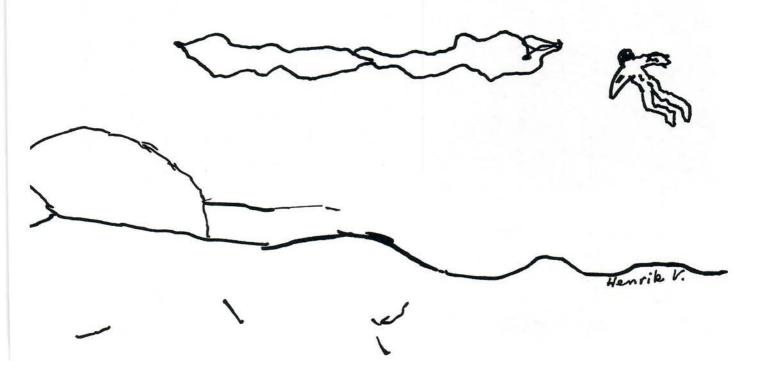
Home-comings

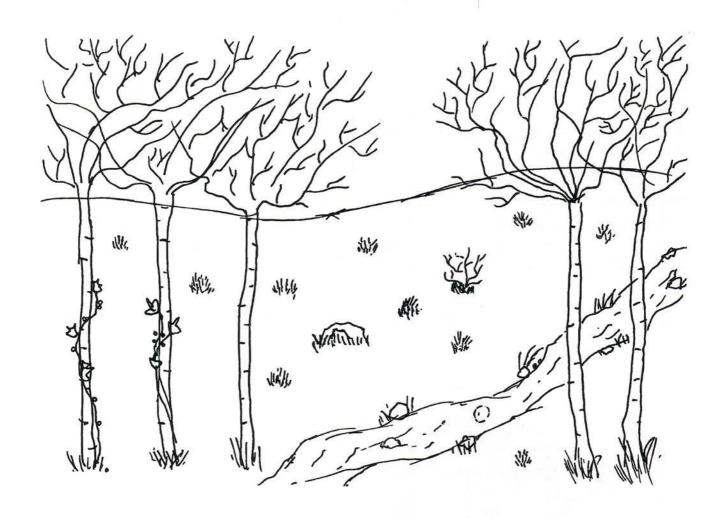
We have been reading a poem called "Home-comings".

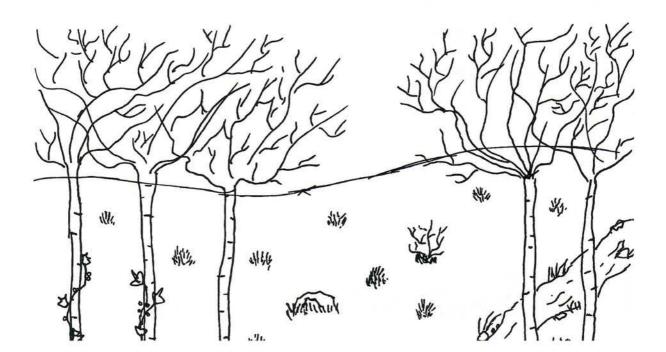




Exposure

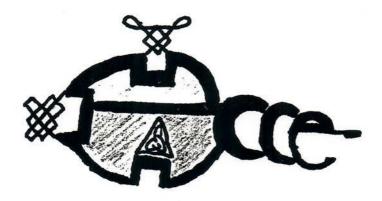


Casualty

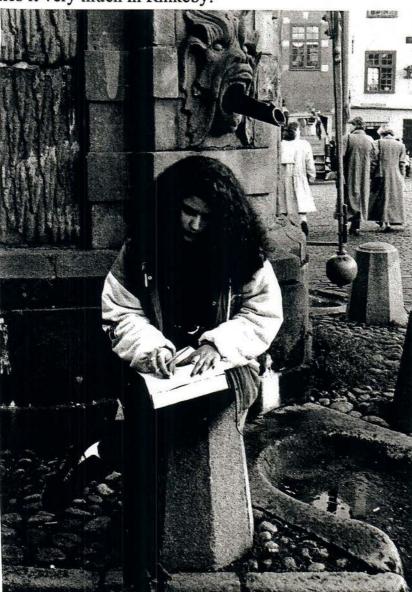

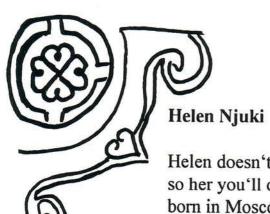
Izla Safar

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The Rinkeby Word & Picture Workshop began in 1983, in honor of the 500th anniversary of the printing of the first book in Sweden. Rinkeby children and youyh drew pictures of their own environment, wrote about their own life, made paper and printed their poems on a simple press. The booklet Rinkeby Writes, Draws and Prints was followed by several other books in which the children wrote in their mother tongues as well as in Swedish.

After our latest book In Rinkeby We Live with Our Hearts (1991) we have continued our work on the themes of "Rinkeby History" and "Crossroads", a study of urban squares. The present booklet to Seamus Heaney includes two of these squares - Rinkeby, "our home square" and Stortorget in the Old Town. Through our work with "Crossroads", we have an exchange with other pedagogues, children and youth throughout the world - in Turkey, South Africa, Cuba, Japan, Estonia, England and Poland.

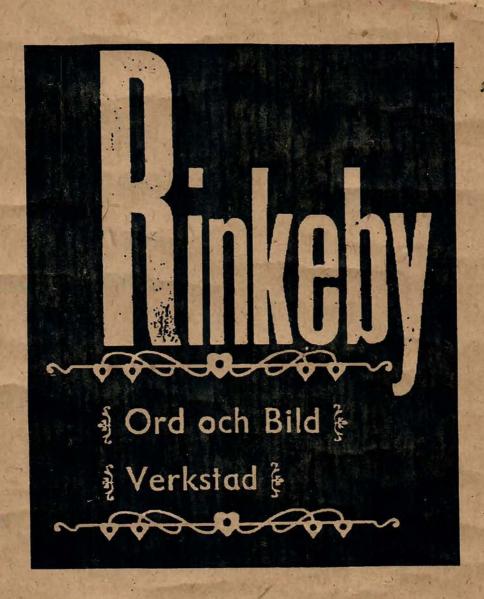
